# Parish Council Elections 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2019

Lancaster City Council and Parish Council elections are both scheduled to take place on Tuesday, 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2019.

The Parish Council has 5 councillor seats and there are opportunities for new candidates to put themselves forward for election. The closing date for the nomination of candidates is Wednesday, 3<sup>rd</sup>April.

The role of Parish Councillor is often a rewarding one although, with the limited powers extended to parish councils, it can also at times be quite challenging. Prospective candidates should have a sympathetic ear to concerns raised by residents of the parish. It is a purely voluntary role – a list of the criteria for election can be obtained from the Parish Clerk.

Councillors are expected to attend Parish Council Meetings, which are typically held every second month on a Tuesday evening. Meetings are held in the Friends Meeting House in Lancaster, commencing at 7.00pm and usually last around 2 hours.

Influence the design specifications of new buildings.


# **Snuff Mill Lane paddling pool**

As many parishioners, cyclists, walkers, dog walkers and idle paddlers will well know the lower part of Snuff Mill Lane has a serious problem with flooding. For some time now there has been a great deal of uncertainty about the ownership of the part of the road beyond the barrier near to the Water Works entrance. United Utilities offered to improve the condition of this track but only if ownership could be defined.

Recalling that the barrier had not existed before the old railway line was converted to a public footpath and cycle track in the 1970s and remembering some earlier research work, I visited Lancaster library and consulted the earliest large-scale Ordnance Survey map of the area dated 1846. This map clearly shows that Snuff Mill Lane continued to a level crossing point on the railway line in order to access a slipway onto the banks of the river Lune. River transport of goods and livestock would have been very common at that time. The map also shows the route of the watercourse, the source of the flooding.

There is a serious blockage of the watercourse at the point marked 'B' on the map (my notation). At this point on the map the watercourse is shown taking a sharp loop to the right into the land now occupied by the Waterworks. It would appear that there is a considerable underground obstacle at this point that the groundworks engineers of that time could not remove so had to go around it. There are many records of 'Erratics' (boulders) left behind by the retreating glaciers of the Ice Age. Perhaps a simple endoscopic survey of the blocked loop at point'B' would help to indicate what work might be required to clear the blockage.

### **Parish Budget**

As Council Tax bills arrive, you may be wondering what's happening with the money raised by the Parish Council. The Council set its 2019/20 budget on 18<sup>th</sup> December 2018, and the figures can be seen in full on the website.

Councillors voted to increase the annual 'precept' – the money raised through Council Tax - from £3,600 to £5,200. This extra money is mainly needed to fund the work of our new Lengthsman. At most, this increase is costing Council Tax payers less than an additional £2 per month.
